Emergency Vehicles In The Cluster

Updates to Design Standards

Over the past 15 years, the board has worked with Reston Association to update our cluster design standards to reflect changing homeowner tastes and the availability of newer and better building materials. Beginning with the color palette, which broadened the spectrum and made possible multiple color combinations, the board also obtained RA approval for such improvements as maintenance-free vinyl and aluminum windows and gutter systems, multiple front door designs, vinyl and aluminum siding and window wraps, additional exterior light fixture options, new color options for privacy and rear fences, and both wooden and brushed aluminum railings for upper level decks.

At it's April meeting, the board approved what we hope is the last of the changes needed to make it truly easy for homeowners to make needed and desired improvements while staying within the cluster standards, rather than having to request exceptions to the standards that require DRB panel approval.

Briefly stated, the latest changes to the standards are:

Bricks: The revised standard emphaizes the requirement that new or replacement bricks match the original bricks as closely as possible, without reference to any particular manufacturer or color. Homeowners will be free to work with their contractors to select and install the new bricks.

House numbers and Mailboxes: The original standards are deleted, leaving homeowners free to make whatever choices they prefer for these elements.

Roof Shingles: The revised standard no longer requires that all houses in each row use the same original shingle color. Instead, it requires only that replacment shingles must match or closely match one of the original three shingle colors—tile red, cedar brown or walnut brown and be three-tab asphalt shingles.

Two additional requested changes require the approval of a DRB panel. The first of these is that while **exterior front and back lights** must conform to the standard, they need not be the exact same fixture. The second is to permit the **wooden railings and support structures of upper level decks**, as an alternative to being left unpainted, painted to match the trim or stained as the current standard specifies, to be treated with a transparent natural wood color sealant.

These last two items will be placed before a DRB panel later this month, and the Handbook will be updated with the complete updated list of standards following the outcome that hearing.
